Arrival & Departure in Australia

With the arrival of rugby fans from all over the world, the airport will be extremely busy so we suggest using public transport as the best way to travel to and from the airport. For specific information, please refer to the Brisbane and Melbourne match package airport information on page 10 and page 14.

Touring Australia

Internal Flight Information

All tours include domestic flights within Australia with Jetstar and Qantas Airways. Please note that e-tickets for these flights will be given to you by your Tour Leader whilst on tour. For specific flight information, please refer to your tour itinerary.

Luggage

Due to the fact that you will be travelling in full coaches and on Australian domestic flights, it is paramount that you stick to the following luggage allowances for the duration of your trip in order to avoid additional baggage charges.

Baggage allowances

- 1 x checked bag with maximum weight of 20kg and dimensions of 73 x 50 x 25cm
- 1 x carry-on bag with maximum weight of 7kgs and dimensions of 55 x 40 x 20cm

Your international flight to Australia may allow you 23kg or more of checked luggage;

however the maximum weight per checked bag on domestic flights is **STRICTLY 20kg** You will be charged an additional fee if your bag exceeds the weight or size requirements.

Money & Currency

Currency in Australia is Australian Dollars (AUD). Money may be withdrawn from ATMs around the country or can be exchanged from currency exchange shops in major cities.

For the most up to date exchange rate, please refer to www.xe.com

In Australia, banking hours are generally Monday to Thursday 9.30am to 4.00pm and Friday 9.30am to 5.00pm. Some banks are open on Saturday mornings.

Many banks also contain Automatic Teller Machines (ATM), whereby money can be accessed through the machines with Visa or MasterCard, provided they are encoded with a Personal Identification Number (PIN). ATM facilities are widely available in the main shopping centres and suburban malls. Please note that banking facilities in remote areas can be limited, especially on weekends. Your Tour Leader will give you advance notice of days when you may not be able to access money easily and will ensure you have ample opportunity to visit a bank/banking facilities beforehand. However, be aware that in these instances you should carry enough cash to last you until you can reach banking facilities. Also, please be aware that you will generally receive a better exchange rate on your international currency in major cities than in rural areas.

International visitors

Please note that not all banks offer ATMs that are compatible with your credit cards. It is advised that you check with your bank prior to leaving in order to ascertain from which ATMs you can access money.


Time & Measurements

Australia is divided into three time zones:

Eastern Standard Time (Queensland, New South Wales, Victoria and Tasmania) is 9 hours ahead of Greenwich Mean Time (GMT), Central Standard Time (Northern Territory, South Australia) is 8½ hours ahead of GMT and Western Standard Time (Western Australia) is 7 hours ahead of GMT.


Electrical Current

The electrical current in Australia is 220-240V AC 50Hz. Power plugs are flat and three-pronged so you may need to bring an adaptor if you are planning to bring any electrical items.









Dress is informal and relaxed on most occasions and a light waterproof jacket and a warmer jacket or coat is recommended. Smart casual dress is acceptable in all restaurants and at game day functions supporter wear is acceptable.

Cairns

Warm temperatures are expected in June with Cairns reaching maximum temperatures of 26°C and minimum of 18°C. Light breathable clothing is recommended and the nights are generally warm.

Alice Springs & Uluru

Alice Springs has a desert climate, however in the winter temperatures can drop to a minimum temperature of 5°C during the night, but reach a maximum temperature of 20°C during the day. Rainfall is low during the winter months, however we recommend for you to bring clothes to cover all bases. This would include a light rain jacket, a coat or winter jacket and light clothes should it reach a warmer temperature.

Darwin

Darwin has a tropical savannah climate with distinct wet & dry seasons and an average maximum temperature of 30°C similar all year round. The weather in June is fairly pleasant with minimum temperature of 20°C. A lightweight &/or waterproof jacket is recommended to have throughout the tour.

Kakadu

Kakadu is monsoonal with June being the dry season reaching maximum temperatures of 32°C.

Also included are pre-match functions on the day of each test match in Brisbane, Melbourne and Sydney. As these functions are prior to the match, we encourage you to proudly wear your supporter colours or your We Love Rugby commemorative jersey ready for the big match!

AAT Kings Tours

It is recommended to bring good walking shoes, a shady hat, sunscreen, insect repellent, a water bottle, an umbrella and a towel and bathers. Passengers that experience sea-sickness may wish to bring medication.





Communications & Contacts

Telephone & Communication

Optus, Telstra and Vodafone all offer roaming agreements. Coverage is available in most areas. Check with your service provider for more details.

WARNING: Higher call rates and charges apply for calls, texts and data when roaming internationally. Please remember you may be charged for all calls and texts made and received whilst you are overseas (if you are based outside of Australia). Check with your provider for call, SMS and data rates.

Phones Cards are also widely available from most convenience stores, newsstands and post offices and are a cheap way of making overseas calls. Follow the dialling instructions on the back of the phone card.

Safety & Emergencies

The majority of travellers enjoy safe and pleasant trips; however you still need to be wary and mindful of the following guidelines:

- Avoid walking alone on streets, particularly after dark
- Walk in well lit areas and avoid obscure alley ways
- Store valuables in a safe place. You should not leave valuables unattended in public places or lying around your hotel room; use the hotel safe in your room or at reception.



In the unlikely event you are in a threatening situation, do not try and be a hero, as your assailant may be armed. Give them what they want and try to remain calm then contact the local police.





Getting to the Match

There are a few transport options to get you from the Brisbane Convention Centre to Suncorp Stadium. Your Suncorp Stadium match ticket entitles you to travel free, to and from matches, on the Queensland Rail City Network and Brisbane Transport Bus services. Simply present your game day ticket to rail and bus staff as you board their services. This free travel offer applies from mid-day to the last scheduled service on game day.

Bus: Shuttle bus, Maroon Glider and the number 385 bus will all take you near the stadium.

They depart on the corner of Melbourne and Grey Street (opposite the cultural centre).

Train: Depart from South Brisbane train stop (pink building on Grey Street).

You will need to take the train to Roma Street and either walk (1400m), or alternatively shuttle buses will be running from Roma Street Train Station directly to the stadium every 5 to 10 minutes.

Walk: Its approximately a 2.5km walk from the BCEC (Brisbane Convention and Exhibition Centre) to Suncorp Stadium. From BCEC head north-west on Merivale Street which will take you over the Go Between Bridge. Cross Coronation Drive using the pedestrian underpass and follow Boomerang Street to Suncorp Stadium.



Transport to Olympic Park

ANZ stadium is located 17km West of Sydney's CBD. Recommended Things to do in Sydney

Inner City Walks

Sydney has some impressive inner city walks. The Opera House to Botanical Gardens walk provides a sweeping view of the Opera House and Sydney Harbour Bridge when you round Mrs Macquarie Point. You could take a stroll around Darling Harbour or Circular Quay and in the city centre take a walk along George or Pitt street.

Bondi to Coogee Walk

The Bondi to Coogee walk is a combination of beaches, parks and spectacular views. This walk has been around since the 1930's and is still one of the hidden gems of Sydney's Eastern Suburbs. It includes Bondi, Tamarama, Bronte, Clovelly and Coogee beaches. The total length is 6km and you should allow about 2 hours from start to finish, in one direction. However, you can do small sections of it depending on your level of fitness.

Sydney's Beaches

Sydney is home to 39 ocean beaches. Carve up the surf, take a scenic walk or simply admire the view from one of the many cafes or bars along Bondi, Coogee, Manly or one of the Northern Beaches. You can take a bus to Bondi Beach (from Circular Quay or Central Station), jump on a ferry to Manly or travel by car to Palm Beach.



Sydney Tower

Measuring 309 metres at its highest point, the Sydney Tower is one of the tallest structures in the southern hemisphere and by far the tallest building in Sydney. Located in the city centre, it costs \$26 per person to go to the top, which offers some incredible views over Sydney.


